Lent, to me, is a time of wandering in the wilderness looking for Signs. I wander a lot on the trails in the Open Spaces surrounding Sun Valley, an area I call Paradise. I often end my

walk at Andy's, order a latte and sit out in front watching the world go by. Recently, as I sat contemplating Life in General and St. Paul's in particular, I suddenly realized that I was whipping out my credit card at least twice a week for a latte that wasn't even particularly good for me.
