St. Paul's **History Corner**

Leading up to St. Paul's 150th anniversary, let's take a look at some of the former church members who are memorialized with their gifts to the glory of God and in remembrance of loved ones.

St. Paul's Centennial Memorial Organ was dedicated on February 27th, 1972. The cost of the new organ was paid for by the parishioners over and above their regular pledges. Commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of St. Paul's Church, the performance of Rev. Al Price was accompanied by San Rafael High School students playing trumpets, trombones and tympani.

The organ was built to the specifications of the Rev. Al Price, the organist and choir master at the time. The organ was built in Germany by the Augustus Laukauf Company. There are two manual keyboards, a pedal board and about 1000 pipes. The plaque on the organ reads:


Centennial Memorial Organ Dedicated to the Glory of God Feb. 27, 1972 In memory of the parishioners who were the body of Christ the first 100 years

St. Paul's Episcopal Church 1868-1968

The Rev. Al Price was the organist/choirmaster at St. Paul's from 1966 to 1974. To introduce the organ to the parishioners and the community, there were four organ recitals featuring local organists.

it was quite muddy: a new organ was desperately needed; the stained glass windows needed repair, and were unprotected; the altar was against the back wall, and the priest had his back to his parishioners.

There were several SPRIFF campaigns to repair and improve the buildings, the grounds and the health of the church. All of our children remember the night when the Marin County Court House burned down. Some of them helped man the hoses to protect the church. When we returned to St. Paul's as parishioners you were in the midst of this SPRIFF III campaign: the creation of the new redesigned courtyard and refurbishment of the parish hall rooms.

Hugh spent many hours in our own family garden. The garden was a source of inspirational joy in the abundance of life's beauty, refreshment of the soul, and a connection to God. Now you, the people of St. Paul's have given him an honor that would astound Hugh. A
